Baseball is a game that uses a bat, a ball, and a 90-foot square field or diamond. Its exact origins are unknown, but historians trace it back to the English game of rounders. It became popular in the 19th Century. In 1845, Alexander Wright of New York formalized the list of rules and invented the modern baseball field.

There are nine players in a baseball team. Each team on offense tries to score runs by hitting a thrown ball with a bat, then running to touch a series of four markers, or bases, around the corner of the field. The team on defense tries to get hitters out. Each team is allowed only three outs and plays offense every inning. At the end of nine innings, the team with the most runs wins.

A good baseball player must be able to hit, throw, and catch the baseball well. It's also good if he can run fast, but stay calm and focused when needed.
