The Body Shop

Anita Roddick is the founder of The Body Shop, a world famous store that sells natural cosmetic products for the body and hair. She opened her first store in England in 1976.

Today, The Body Shop has over 2,000 stores in more than 50 different countries.

The Body Shop practices "community trading," which involves working with suppliers and manufacturers in third world countries.

Roddick says, "Our goal is to help create a tool for communities in poor countries to benefit through employment, income, skills development, and social initiatives."

The cosmetic industry doesn't normally make one think of the qualities of humanitarianism, but that is exactly where Anita Roddick has created a platform from which she can educate consumers and companies worldwide about that very idea. "Wealth can make people insensitive," says Roddick. "I've always promised myself I would never let that happen to me."
