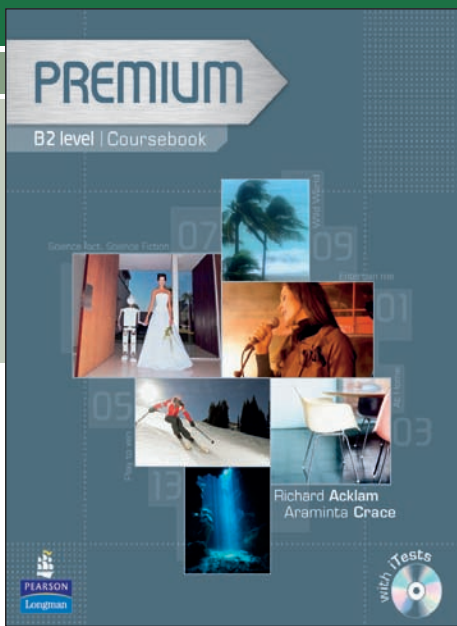

Taking a bite at the Big Apple

Four women entrepreneurs who have found success in New York

Empire Szechuan Gourmet Restaurant Chain

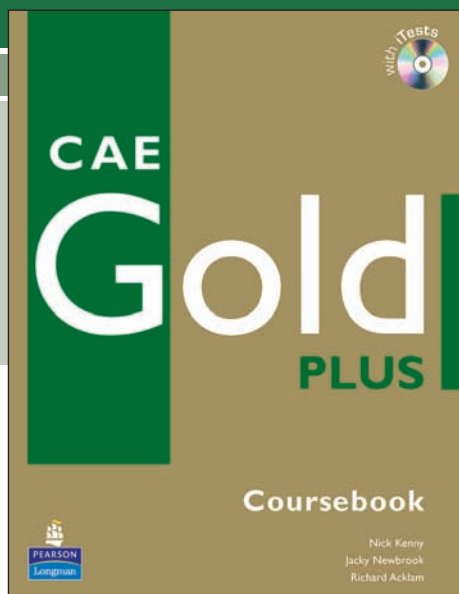
When Misa Chang opened her first restaurant in New York with \$5,000, almost 23 years ago, she had six tables and a handful of employees. Today, her empire spans the globe and includes 12 Empire Szechuan Gourmet restaurants and over 1,000 employees. Misa emigrated from Taiwan in the 1970s with her student husband. In 1976, she started a small restaurant near her home to supplement the family's income. To gain a greater share of the business, she kept the restaurant open later than her competitors and soon earned a reputation for serving good food. In 1979, the *New York Times* gave her restaurant a rave review and her business took off. An inspiring and vivacious woman, her original associates and colleagues are still with her. Her motherly ways have earned the respect of all her employees, who call her 'Mama'. When asked what advice she would give to entrepreneurs, Misa stated 'Be nice to people and that gives you good luck. I have so many good friends because of my many customers. When they come in the restaurant, that is my happy hour.'

Shin Choi emigrated to the US in 1979 after graduating from university in Korea. She thought that the garment industry would offer her opportunities, and she soon found a job in a New York clothing manufacturers, where she learned the business from the ground up. Although she loved her job there, she saw a need for beautiful well-made clothing at affordable prices and felt she had to go off on her own to implement her ideas. So at the age of 32, Shin obtained a loan from her family to set up her own business, naming her company Coleridge & Co. The first season, her entire line sold straightaway. However, despite sales of \$1 million, the company lost money. It took two years for her to reverse that trend, but little by little her name became associated with fine clothing and for the last 5 years, her revenue has grown more than 10% each year. Shin's advice for entrepreneurs is 'Go for it. It is not easy, but your hard work will produce rewarding results.'

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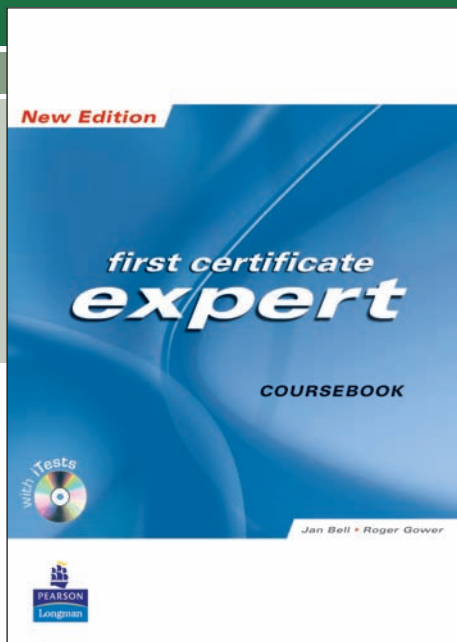

Angling

It is difficult to know why angling (fishing with a rod, line and hook) is (0) **one** of the most popular outdoor pursuits in Britain, with anywhere between two and four million taking part on (1) regular basis. For a father, (2) able to spend some 'quality' time with his son must be a big attraction, but why should grown adults, on (3) own, spend hours in the wind and rain, looking at the water, or standing waist-high in waterproof boots in the hope they catch a fish? When they (4), they will probably throw it back anyway!

For the benefit of beginners, (5) are two types of angling: course fishing, where you dangle a worm in the water and hope that you manage (6) attract a passing fish, or fly-fishing, where you drag colourful, artificial flies across or just (7) the surface of the water to lure the fish.

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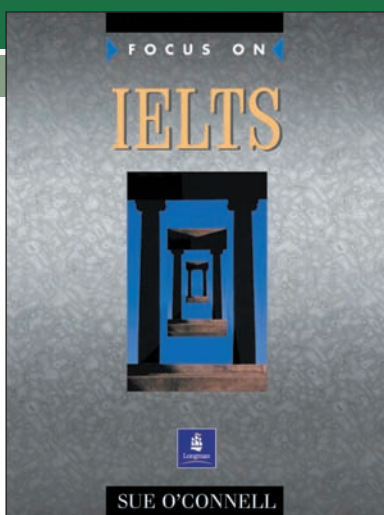
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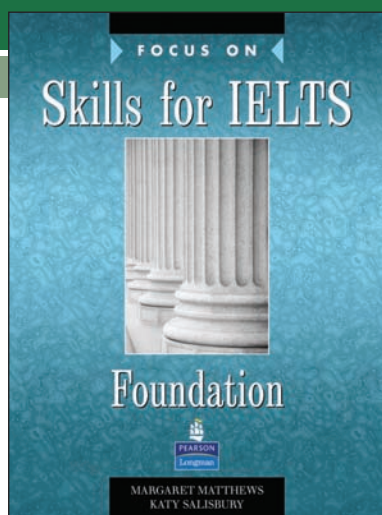
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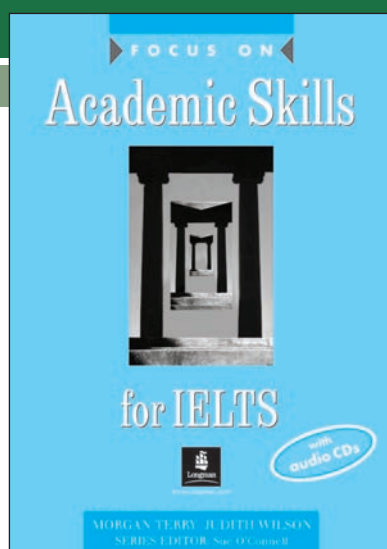
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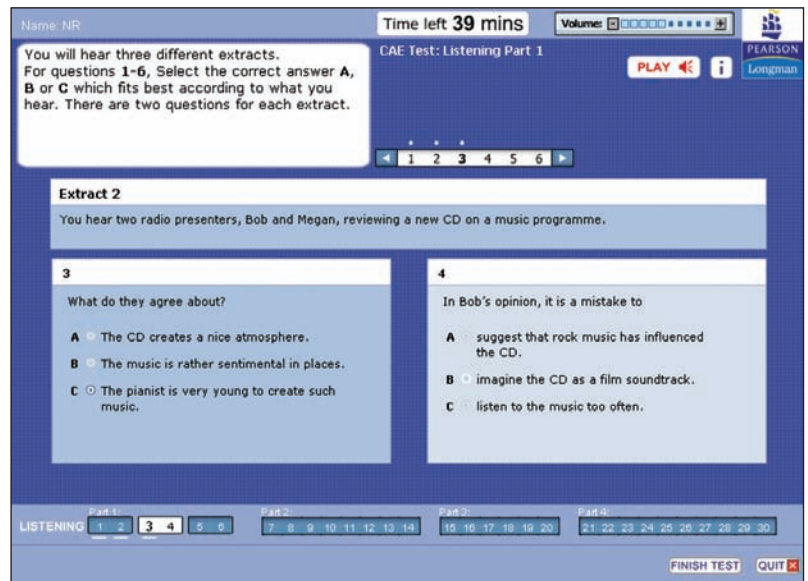
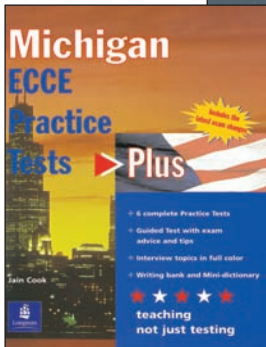
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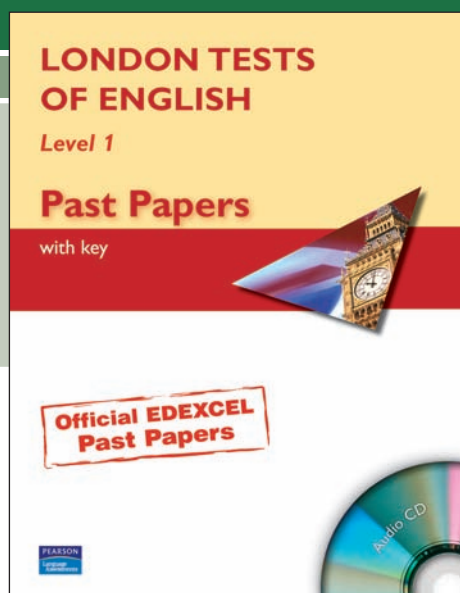
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Screen shot of iTests - CAE Listening Part 1

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
